I-64 Project, Finalist in National Transportation Award Competition

MoDOT's I-64 St. Louis Project has been selected as one of the 10 national finalists in the 2010 America's Transportation Awards competition. A panel of national transportation experts picked the project from more than 43 entries representing 29 states in the categories of on-time, under budget, innovative management and best recovery act. According to John Horsley, AASHTO Executive Director, "The awards honor the very finest projects in the country and the I-64 Project is truly deserving of this recognition."

As one of the Top 10, the project is now in the running for two prizes: the Grand Prize and the People's Choice Awards. Both winners will receive a \$10,000 cash prize, which can be donated to the charity or scholarship fund of their choosing.

While the Grand Prize will be determined by a panel of transportation experts, the People's Choice Award will be selected through online voting, which begins September 7, 2010 and continues through October 18, 2010. The winners will be announced at the AASHTO Annual Meeting in Biloxi, Mississippi on October 31, 2010.

AASHTO will announce the Top 10 via a national news release on Tuesday, September 7, 2010. Last year over 200,000 votes were cast for the People's Choice Award.

Information about Voting for the People's Choice Award

AASHTO will have their website ready for voting by noon Tuesday, September 7 and voting will continue through October 18. You are encouraged to vote by:

- Logging on to the AASHTO home page at <http://www.transportation.org> and click on the America's Transportation Awards icon. You can also go directly to the Awards home page at <http://www.americastransportationaward.org>.
- The Awards page will have a link to vote for one of the Top 10 finalists.
- There is no limit to the number of times you can vote.
- Paper ballots can be cast at the Annual Meeting in October, but the online voting should have determined a clear winner by that time. If the contest is close enough that ballots cast at the Annual Meeting could make a mathematical difference, they will be used.
- Although it has never happened, it is possible for a project to win both the Grand Prize and the People's Choice Award.
