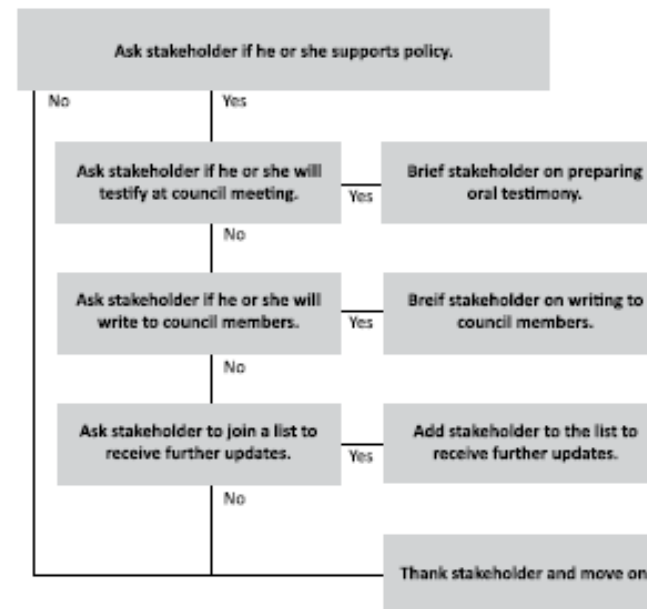

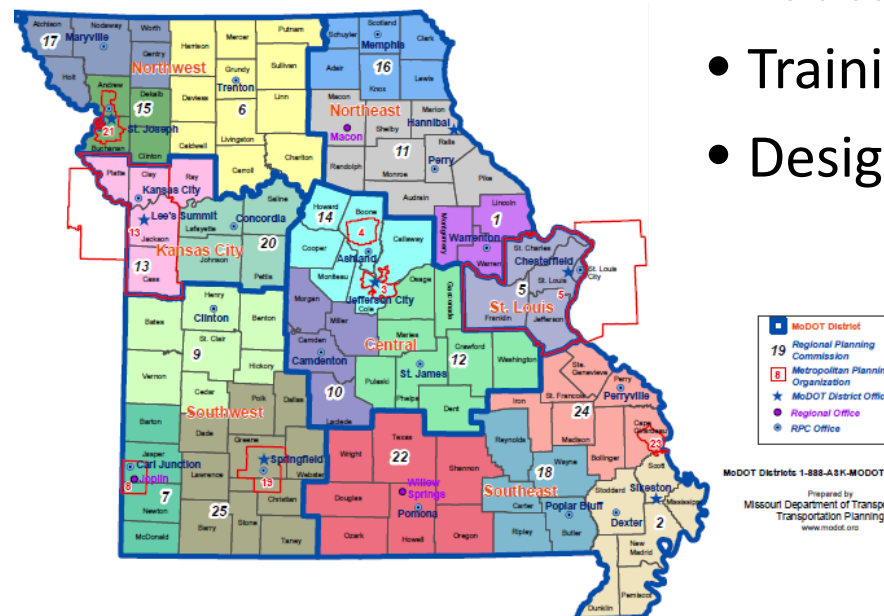

- Paved shoulders in rural areas.

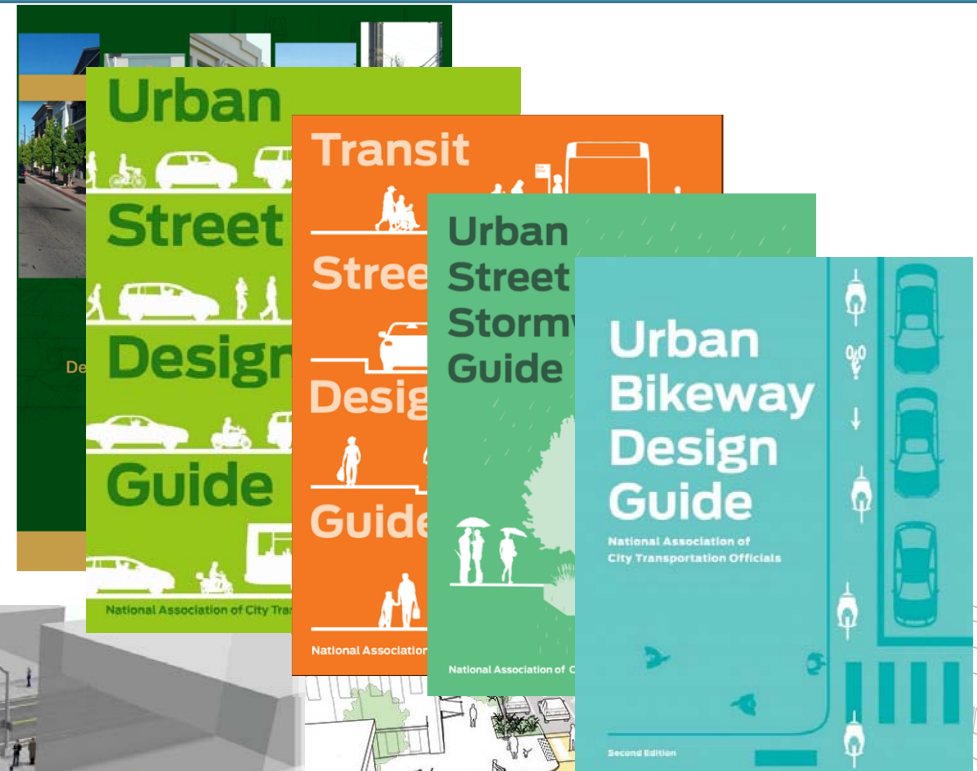
