First grade students painted, cut, and glued pieces of trash to create "critters" of all kinds to represent their Critters against Litter: Keep the environment clean!

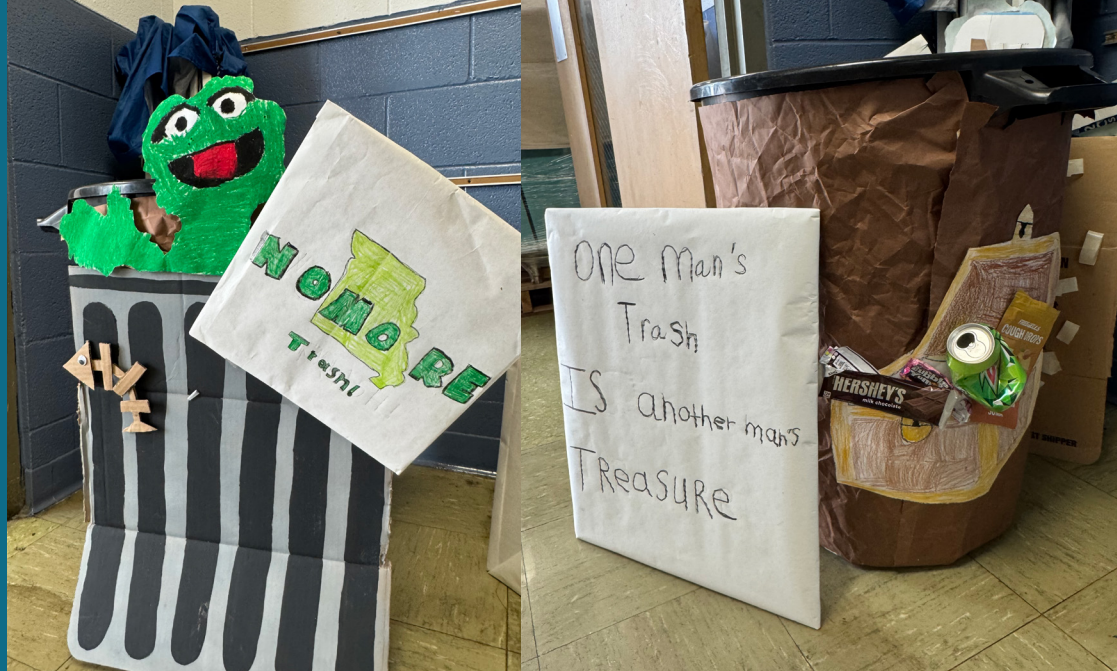

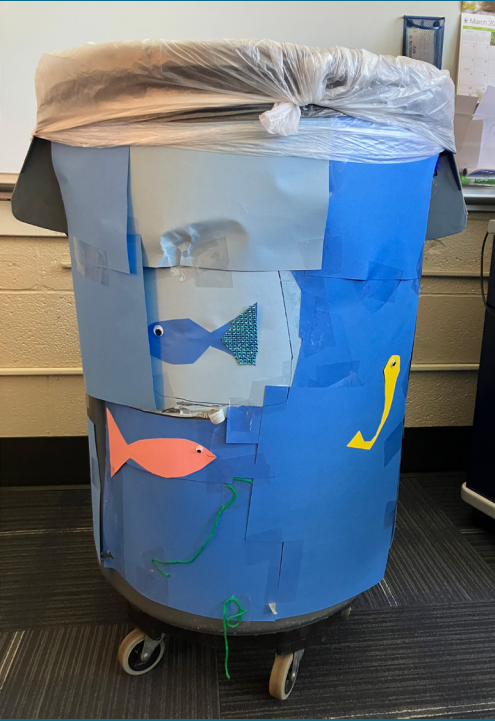
Project Description:

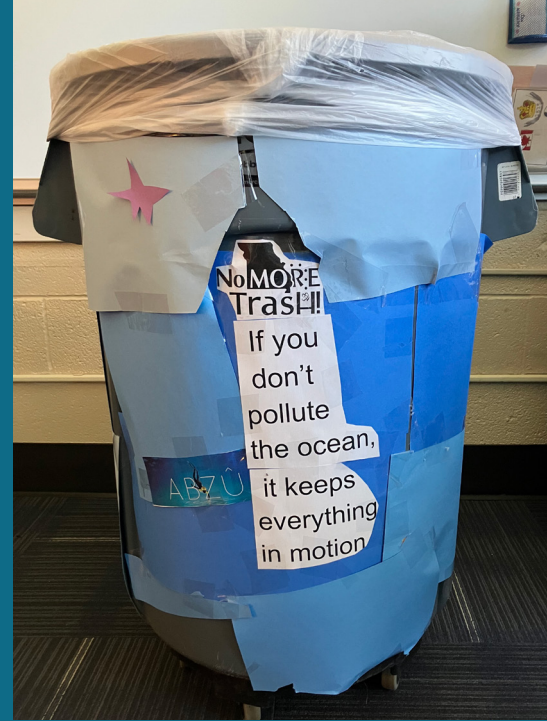

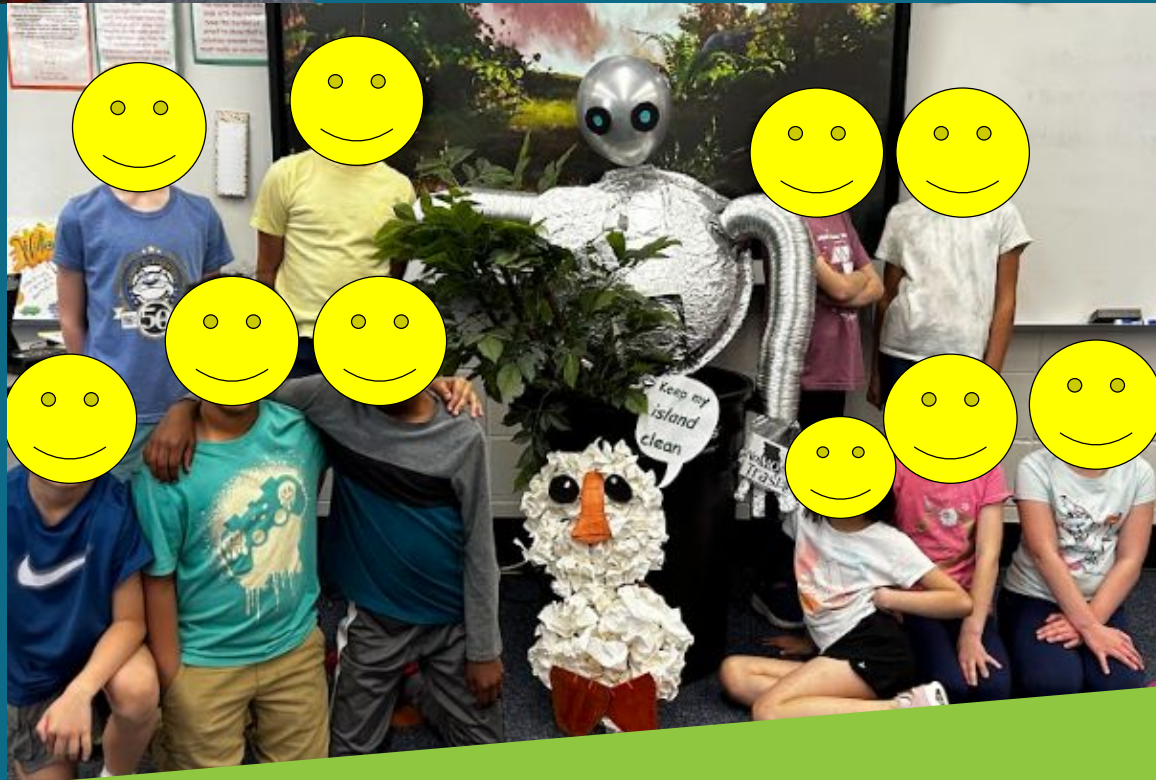
Project Description:

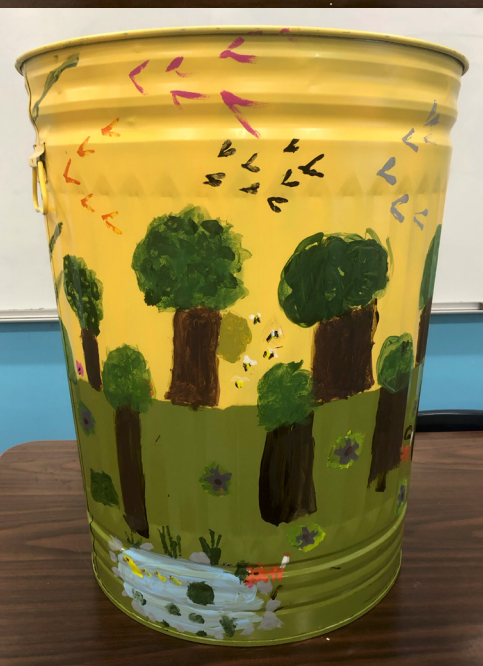
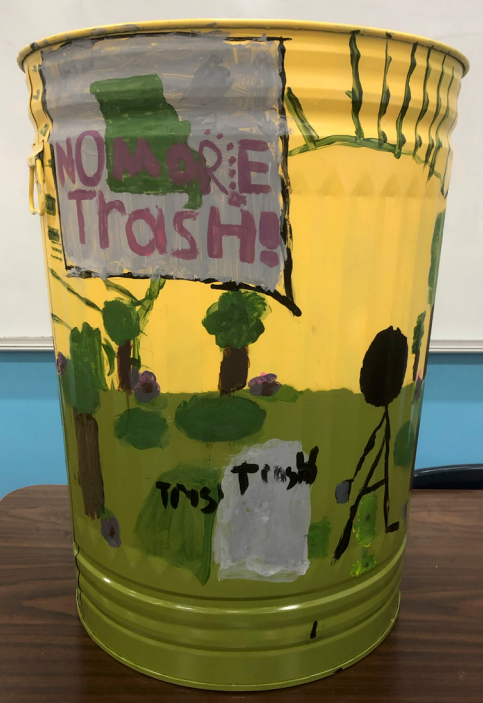
Project Title:

5th grade students at Missouri School for the Deaf had fun designing and constructing a trashcan with Tom and Jerry reminding everyone to "Keep it clean!"



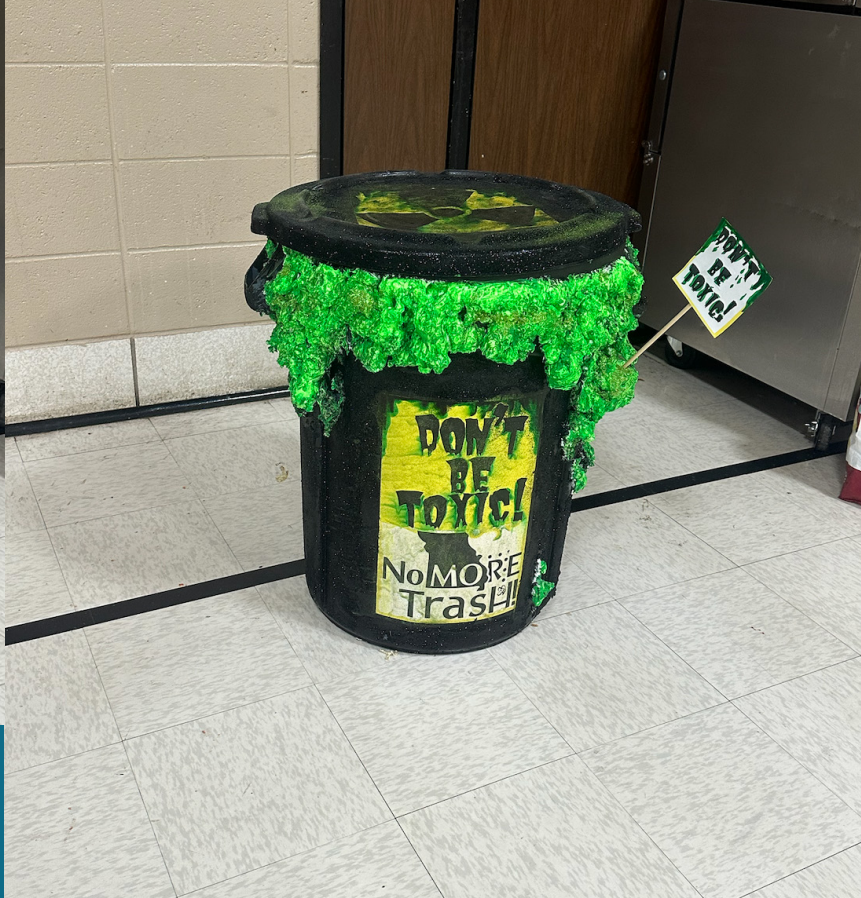

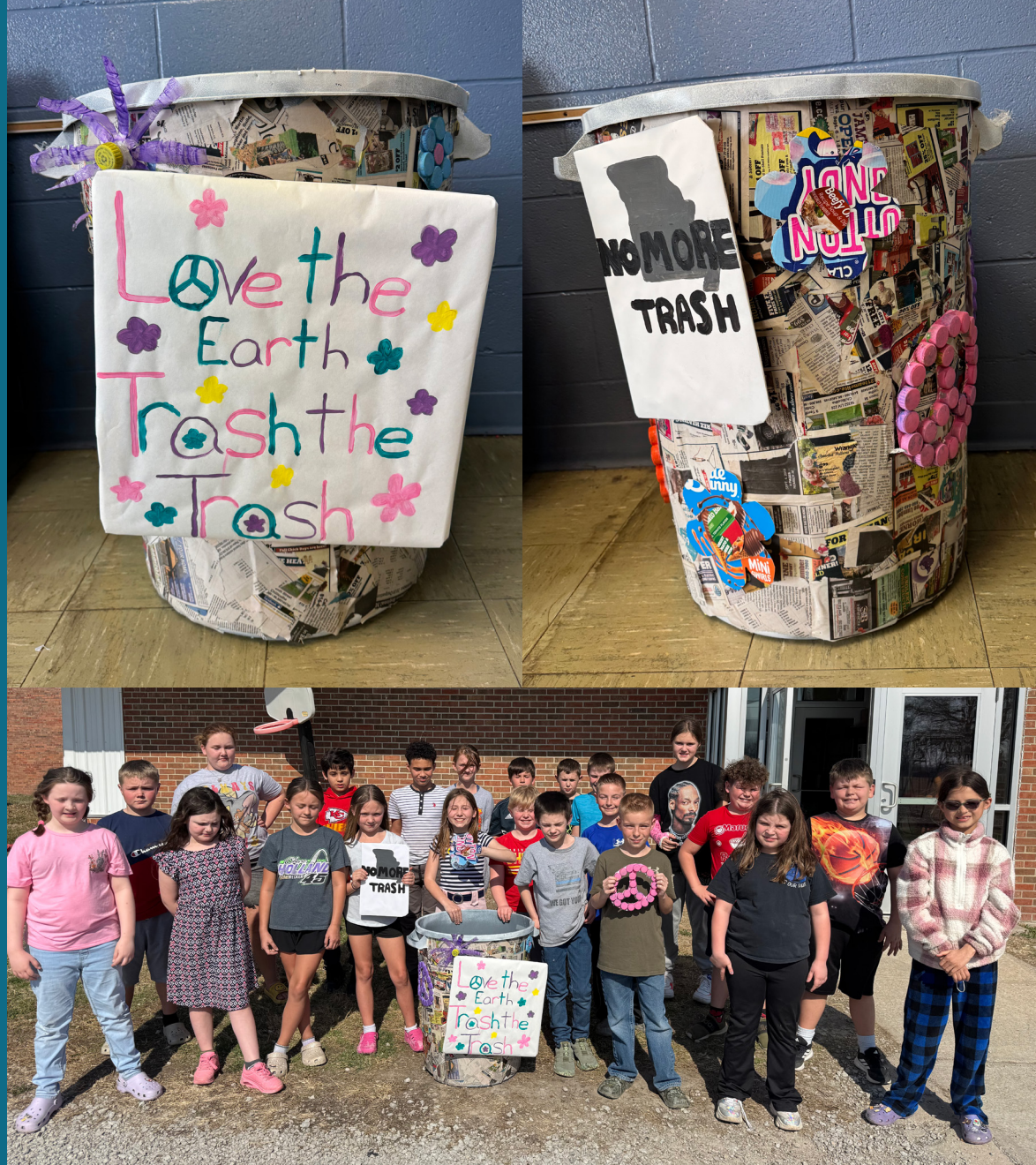

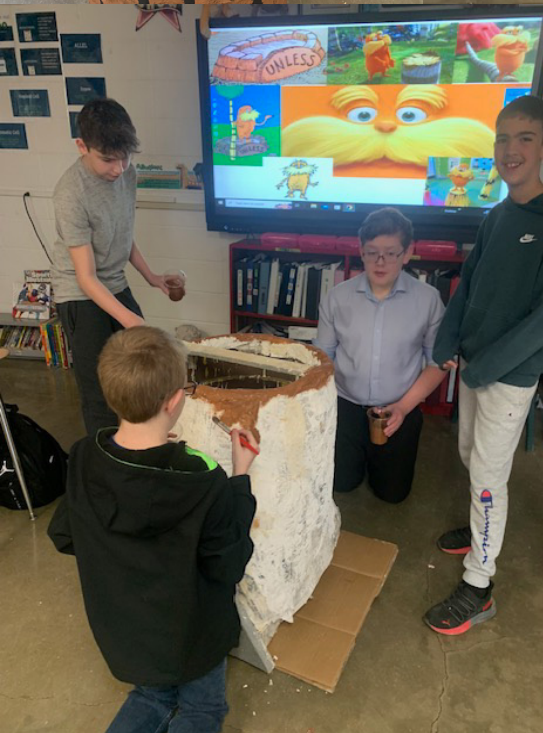
Project Description:

In an inspiring initiative, two middle school classes collaborated on a project titled "Don't Get Hooked on Litter," which focused on designing an innovative trash can. After submitting various design entries, students participated in a voting process to select their favorite. As part of this project, they organized a cleanup effort to collect trash around their campus and along a local creek, highlighting the importance of environmental stewardship. To further raise awareness about the impact of litter on local wildlife, students created representations of aquatic species such as a catfish, bass, snapping turtle, and a water snake, emphasizing the vital connection between pollution and Missouri's streams and rivers. Recycled materials and litter is incorporated into the design. 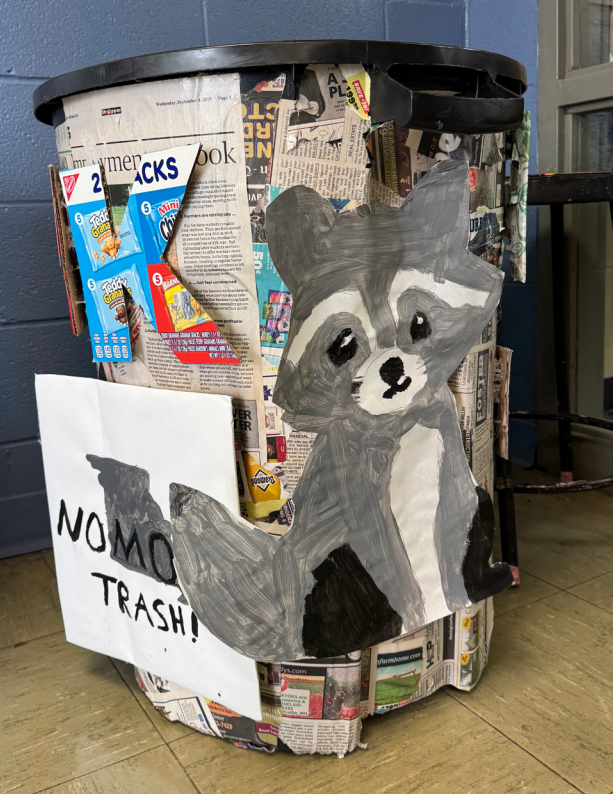

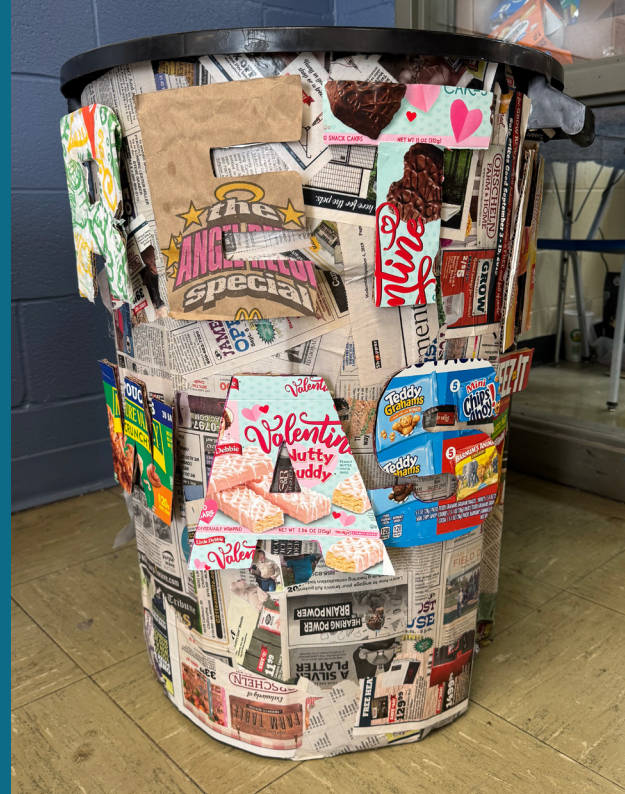
Project Description:

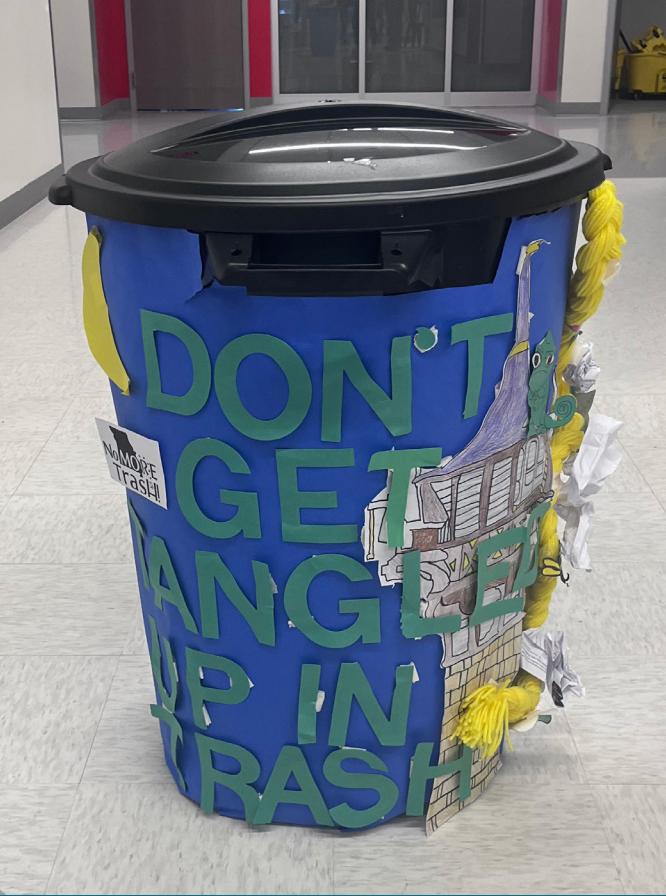

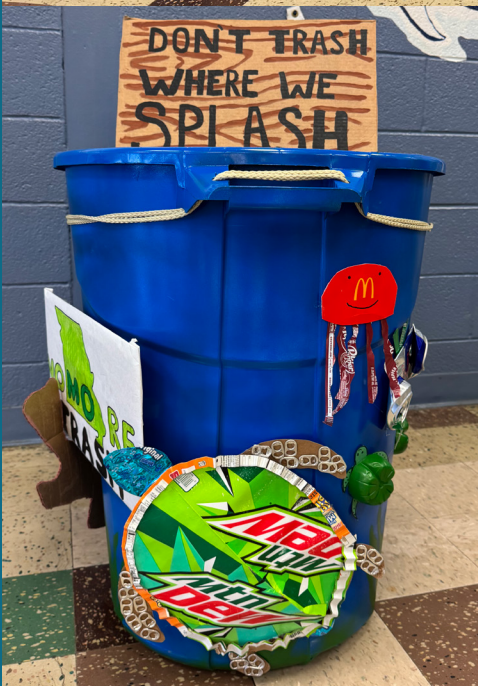
Project Title:
